## **PRESIDENT'S NOTE 2021**

Our theme for 2021 has been *Strength in Community*. When I took over the presidency at the beginning of this year, little did we know the importance of IWC in our lives as the Covid-19 Pandemic continued to affect and limit our world. Fortunately, this year I have been honoured to work with an exceptional board - creative, fluid, and driven to create the best possible opportunities for our members in a difficult situation.

Inspired by the capability of technology, I, along with the board, instituted several initiatives to keep our club functioning and thriving even when it was impossible to gather together at Kelvin Grove. We worked around the many restrictions imposed upon us by the pandemic in order to give our members the fullest IWC experience possible.

One of the major achievements of this year include us remaining active as a club and holding meetings every month, something many other clubs around Cape Town and even the world were unable to do. Continuing the work started by the 2020 IWC Media and Communications chair, Zoom meetings continued to be a success while we couldn't meet physically; diverse speakers such as published authors, transgender doctors, an authority on Japanese culture and well-respected wine experts shared their time and expertise with us virtually to great acclaim.

We discovered that one of the unexpected benefits of a Zoom meeting is that IWC Cape Town members logged in to Zoom not only from Cape Town but also joined us from England, Portugal, the USA, Switzerland and Sweden to name a few. We are using technology to truly honour the international mandate of our club!

Speaking of the international nature of our club, I have also worked hard to create excellent collaboration with IWC clubs overseas. While we were "grounded" during strict lockdown, we reached out to other IWC clubs around the world to share ideas and see how they were dealing with the changing world. We had excellent responses from Stockholm, Sweden, thanks to an introduction from member Elizabeth Handley, Vilnius, Lithuania, Dublin, Ireland, Italy, and Lugano, Switzerland. As we opened ourselves up to other clubs, we were able to use technology to share activities and programming together.

Via the Zoom platform we had a cultural exchange with the IWC of Vilnius, virtual tours of Venice and Tuscany from the previous president of the American Women's Club of Rome, and several cooking classes with the IWC Stockholm to name a few. A particularly wonderful example was cooking Goulash...it was hosted by the Hungarian ambassador's chef, who only spoke Hungarian and French, so our IWC host had to translate from French to Swedish, and another IWC host from Swedish to English! Our club also contributed to these exchanges as well. Margaret Abbott gave a lecture on "Gardens of the Cape," Liliana Carter shared her "Great Journeys" and Elizabeth Handley her "Music Appreciation," all of which were enthusiastically enjoyed by our collaborating clubs. This has been an excellent way of creating and enlarging our community throughout the world. It also gave us hope that the pandemic would end shortly, and motivation to stay resilient while looking towards the future.

When we were finally able to meet in person again, we worked hard to make it the best experience for our members possible. Our first Kelvin Grove guest speaker was Alan Committie, a comedian who brought laughter to our members. We were also able to host an exclusive Masterclass demonstration with the Cape Town Ballet, a music lecture on

Beethoven, and learn about the fascinating world of sharks. In more exciting news, we will even return to our traditional “Year-End Celebration” in the Kelvin Grove Ballroom on the second Thursday of November this year, something unworkable last year due to Covid-19 restrictions.

All of our live meetings are now Hybrid on the Zoom Platform; even if members cannot join at the club, they can still watch the meeting online in real time. We also now record the meetings and, thanks to Wendy Coetzee, they are edited and uploaded to YouTube and can be accessed via our new website by members.

Speaking of which, a big achievement for our club is the new website. A website is virtual real estate, and often the first introduction for those wanting to know more about our organisation. Our old website was confusing and used stock photos. Our new website is easily navigable, has a dedicated “Members Only” section, and is a snapshot into the wonderful activities and community our IWC has created. Please do check it out and sign in to see the fresh new look, as well as current and past newsletters. I’d also like to give a great big “Thank You” to Victoria Dickerson for all the hard work she put into updating it and helping create a more efficient layout. The call to action that she created for the website: “Make Friends, Make Memories, Make a Difference” is now our club slogan as it so perfectly encapsulates the objectives of our organisation.

Lastly, I am proud to say that we have secured pro bono help from a leading Cape Town law firm to help assist us with updating our constitution, which will contribute to the long-term stability of our club.

I’d like to close this note with a great big thank you to all our members who stayed with us during this difficult year, and for the new members who have joined based on the strength of our new initiatives. We have been able to keep our club numbers stable, and this is an excellent indicator that our strong effort is paying dividends. Our board has worked hard to keep our membership strong and connected, and we thank you for supporting us, for not giving up on us, and for helping us all stay together on our journey during the upheaval of the 2021 year.

## **TREASURER'S REPORT 2021**

The IWC continues to remain in a strong financial position. The club has adjusted admirably to the regulatory restrictions due to the pandemic, becoming more flexible and agile in managing our activities. The financial management is far more efficient as our members use technology more.

We started the year from a healthy position, with good membership numbers and the annual subscription fee at R400. The fee was at a discounted rate due the lockdown restrictions impacting on the club activities in the previous year. The COVID impact account accrued in the previous year was used to subsidise the 2021 fees.

Our expenses were well managed and remained less than a fully functioning club, due to lockdown regulations. The club expenses have increased this year for functions and meetings, lunches, speaker fees, badges, printing & stationery and hospitality& gifts as activities start to resume. We will host a year end function; the format may be different to the past.

After making some good investments last year, our technology expenses were less than anticipated this year. The website redesign in particular, was materially lower than budgeted for. The regular expenses for our hybrid style meetings (in-person and/or online) including additional audio requirements, ZOOM and webinars, are now expected to be ongoing expenses in the future. This has been budgeted for as such.

Philanthropic income has increased this year, but has still been severely hampered by not having our regular monthly meetings. The Board decided to continue to make monthly donations of R 3000 to the selected charities during the months that we did not have in-person club meetings. A lump sum payment is anticipated to be donated at year end to some selected charities voted for by the members.

Apart from the subscription fees, we have not earned any additional income that the Club typically generates. No fundraising activities could take place and visitors fees were lower than usual as we only had a few monthly club meetings where the numbers were restricted.

The IWC Board has agreed that membership fees for 2022 will be R500. The amount remains at a discounted rate due to lockdown regulations having limited club activities this year. This is an increase from the 2021 discounted rate as we are mindful that future club meetings will in all likelihood resume to some form of normalcy. The 'new normal' does add some additional club expenses including the hybrid format that may become a permanent fixture.

As the club activities slowly resume back to previous levels, it is important to note that we envisage that this discount will only apply for 2022 and future fees will revert back to 'normal' from 2023.

A COVID impact account was accrued in anticipation of the lower fee income to be received next year. This was based on the reduced subscription fees.

The club cash reserves, held in a 32-day Notice deposit account, remain untouched and have continued to earn interest. The Club has sufficient reserves for a year's expenses, which is pleasing.

**REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITOR TO THE BOARD OF CONTROL OF THE INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S CLUB.**

I have audited the annual financial statements of the International Women's Club which comprise the balance sheet as at 30<sup>th</sup> September 2021, the income statement for the year then ended and other explanatory notes.

**Board's responsibility for the Financial Statements**

The Board is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these annual financial statements, which includes implementing and maintaining internal controls. The Board also selects and applies appropriate accounting policies and makes accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

**Auditor's responsibility**

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these annual financial statements based on my audit. The audit was performed to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement. The audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of the accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence that I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

**Qualification**

In common with similar organisations, it is not feasible for the organisation to institute accounting controls over cash collection of fees from activity groups prior to initial entry of the collections in the accounting records. Accordingly it was impractical for me to extend my examination beyond the receipts actually recorded.

**Opinion**

In my opinion, except for the effect of the first matter referred to above, the financial statements are a true and fair reflection of the Club's finances.

## **THE SECRETARY'S REPORT**

Although the year was characterised by Covid-19 and its challenges, this year's IWC Board was never deterred from continuing in its quest to serve its members. There simply had to be a way of working within the numerous Covid levels and restrictions while still providing the members with as many meetings and activities as was possible.

Although always putting the health and safety of members first, the goal became to hold a General Meeting each month, regardless of whether it was done virtually or in a hybrid-style and then in the fullest sense, by welcoming new members, supporting philanthropy, introducing guest speakers and attending to any Club business required.

During the planning of these meetings, we realised that it was necessary to track attendance in order to establish whether we were reaching as many of our members as possible. This led to a monthly attendance report being drawn up, showing how many members had attended in person, via Zoom or had accessed the recording on our YouTube link. We soon realised that each avenue was vital, particularly with some members being overseas, and although the figures have varied from month to month, we are of the opinion that a satisfactory number of members have gained access to our meetings and presentations, confirming that we are on the right track.

In the course of the year, we also started considering the value of our database as it became apparent that the information recorded could be most helpful in assessing the need and format of group and other activities offered by the Club. Unfortunately, there were gaps in information – hence the need arose to contact some members in an effort to update our database and make it more relevant. I wish to thank all those members with whom I was in contact and who so kindly responded and provided the details required.

As the year progressed, we found ourselves consulting the current Club Constitution more and more often to ensure that we were following correct procedures and upholding the terms of the Constitution in every way. A number of questions and ambiguities arose which led us to believe that our Constitution needed clarification and updating. Thanks to Amanda, a well-known law firm has agreed to place the IWC on its list of pro bono clients and, we are happy to announce that, in the year ahead, we will get expert legal advice on our Constitution to ensure that it complies with modern financial and legal regulations and to iron out any anomalies that have arisen over the years.

The Board has also discussed the best way forward regarding the safekeeping of secretarial and financial information using available technology and will ensure that the necessary data for this year will be stored for easy access and use by Boards in the years to come. In the new year, the capturing of past information in the same manner should be given priority.

I wish to thank Amanda and Victoria for their efforts in revising the Club website this year. According to the Constitution, the minutes of the monthly General Meetings need to be displayed at our meetings at Kelvin Grove. During the pandemic, this was not possible. Now, thanks to the revised format, you will find the minutes of each of the meetings held this year on our website under the section entitled Meetings. The same applies to the monthly newsletters which can be accessed at any time during the year. Again, it wasn't just a case of being compliant, we felt it necessary to reach as many of our members as possible, whether in South Africa or elsewhere, with the information that they were entitled to, as members of IWC.

I wish to take this opportunity of thanking Shahiema Davids and her team at Kelvin Grove for their consistent support. We have built a strong relationship with Kelvin Grove over the years and we appreciate their efforts in meeting our requirements and the friendly and co-operative manner in which they assist us at every turn, particularly during this time of Covid-19, when Government rules keep changing. It makes the planning and organisation of meetings run smoothly and efficiently.

I also wish to extend my personal gratitude to Amanda, our President, for her leadership and encouragement and my fellow Board members for their co-operation and support during the year. We have built a strong team, streamlined the operations of the Board and have worked together exceptionally well. It is a year that I will always remember, especially for the relationships formed and I have got to know many more members than I otherwise might have. Finally, let me say that it has been a pleasure to serve you, the members of IWC, during this 2021 year.

Thanks to Geraldine Berry, who delivers our collected bottle tops and bread tags, for which we receive money which goes to the purchase of wheelchairs.

For November, IWC is collecting donations for Funda Kunye NPC ('Learn Together') who train, empower, support, and equip caregivers who own or run day-cares in informal areas in the Hout Bay region. Funda Kunye teaches the importance of age-appropriate stimulation, nurture and love for the children in their care, focusing on 3-month-old babies to 3-year-old toddlers. Many of these day-cares have very little or no age-appropriate equipment, leaving the children unstimulated and uneducated. Items required include puzzles, wall charts, wooden blocks and Lego, as well as stationery typically used at pre-school centres.

Through their training, they hope to reduce developmental delays and/or challenges later in the lives of the children being impacted, which can change the trajectory of their future!

Once again thank you all. Please remember, we find a home for everything, nothing goes to waste.
